HWEC Members Giving to the community

Operation Round Up Foundation

Holmes-Wayne Electric Cooperative members can voluntarily have their electric bill rounded up to the nearest dollar every month. Those quarters, dimes, nickles and pennies are placed in the Holmes-Wayne Electric Operation Round Up Foundation. The funds are returned back to organizations, families and individuals within our community. **Since the establishment of the Holmes-Wayne Electric Operation Round Up program in January of 2006, you, the members, through the Foundation have given back more than \$240,000 to our community.** This program is making a big impact on many lives within our community for just pennies!

One of the community programs to receive a donation from the Foundation is Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry (FHFH). This program uses donated funds to process deer during the fall deer hunting season. The venison is given to local agencies to feed those in need within our community. Last fall, the Foundation gave \$1,000 to both the Holmes County and Wayne County FHFH programs. In Holmes County, FHFH processed 106 deer, which resulted in 5,500 pounds, or 22,000 servings, of venison. Wayne County FHFH processed 85 deer, which resulted in 4,851 pounds of ground venison that was provided to 11 different agencies.

Thanks to all the members who have generously chosen to round up their electric bill every month to make a dramatic impact in our neighborhood.

We will also have local agencies available to assist with applications for Ohio's home heating assistance program.


Maybe you're thinking about changing your windows and doors, learn more about the federal tax credits that are available.
