As THIS LETTER IS BEING COMPOSED, the next five-day forecast has a high in the teens and lows in the single digits. I don't need to tell you that Ohio winters can be very brutal. That is when we are often called upon to look after our neighbors and the elderly in our community. It also can be a very dangerous time for those less fortunate.

Our community is known for its kinship and the way we come together to take care of our own. One of those examples is the Holmes-Wayne Electric Operation Round Up[®] program. We are beginning our 12th year of the program, which allows you — the member-owners of the cooperative — to round up your HWEC bill every month.

The change that you donate monthly is placed into our Operation Round Up Foundation, which then disburses funds to individuals, families, and organizations in need within our community. Operation Round Up is not meant to be a replacement of current local organization and program funding but is meant to help those who may have slipped through the cracks, or assist those in dire circumstances.

In the last 11 years, over \$500,000 has been distributed back to the community through this foundation. That is a pretty amazing accomplishment when you consider that the entire amount of money was raised by just rounding your bill to the next even dollar every month.

The remaining funds are in interest-bearing

accounts. These funds will continue to be used for future requests and as a rainy day fund for large catastrophic events.

Funds are distributed by a five-member volunteer board selected by your Holmes-Wayne Electric Board of Trustees. It is an honor for me to serve on this board, and I want to thank the board members for their donated time and dedication to our community. The additional members include President of the Board Dan Mathie, Vice President Jonathan Berger, Secretary Lisa Grassbaugh, and Matt Johnson. As a board, we take sincere responsibility of being good stewards of your donated funds.

IN JANUARY 2006, Holmes-Wayne Electric Cooperative introduced a new community service program called Operation Round Up[®]. This program allows HWEC members to round up their monthly electric bill to the next even dollar. The spare change is placed into a foundation to be distributed to those in need within our community.

Members of HWEC have given almost half a million dollars back to the community. This is an amazing testament to our members' generosity and concern for our community.

Applicants for assistance must live within the local community, and all applications are reviewed

by a five-member board. We give a special thanks to the following board members for volunteering their time: President Dan Mathie, Vice President Jonathan Berger, Secretary Lisa Grassbaugh, Matt Johnson, and HWEC CEO Glenn Miller.

Medical Awareness Certification

Is someone living in your home with a medical condition that requires electrical assistance? If so, you must notify Holmes-Wayne by completing the form below to be added or remain on our Medical Awareness list.

The HWEC Medical Awareness list is used to notify you of any planned outages for maintenance and repair as well as uncontrollable outages such as weather conditions or car accidents. During these "standard" outages, the member on the list is given first consideration when your specific line is being restored.

Holmes-Wayne makes every effort to keep power flowing to every member's home at all times. Because of factors beyond our control, it is always our recommendation that you create a backup plan in case of a power outage. This may be as simple as having a small generator available or the ability to relocate if such a situation were to occur.

The Medical Awareness Certification form must be completed on an annual basis.
