THE VALUE OF YOUR COOPERATIVE MEMBERSHIP

How we allocate capital credits to YOU

hat are capital credits, you ask? At the end of each year, Holmes-Wayne Electric Cooperative calculates its margin, which is the amount by which its revenue exceeded its expenses during the year. We then allocate the margin as capital credits to each member based on the amount of electricity he or she purchased throughout the year.

On your May bill, you will notice the capital credits you were allocated for 2017, if you were a member receiving power in 2017. You will also receive an allocation of capital credits from our power generation utility, Buckeye Power, which is also a cooperative. HWEC is a memberowner of Buckeye Power, so Buckeye Power allocates capital credits to HWEC based on the same principles. We, in turn, allocate these capital credits assigned to your account for the prior year.

In the interim, we use the capital credits that are allocated but unretired to improve and expand our electric system and meet our other capital needs. This reduces our need to borrow money and allows us to provide reliable electric service and maintain low rates.

Every year, our board of trustees reviews our financial requirements and determines if we can retire the capital

credits as cash. Capital credits are currently being retired on an industry target of a 20-year cycle. When retired, they are returned via checks to our members.

Why do we do this? As an electric co-op, we are here to provide the best service at the lowest cost. We aren't here to make a profit, and we don't have shareholders. As a member-owner of an electric co-op, you invest in its efficient operation. Unlike an investor-owned utility, we don't pay dividends or other amounts to shareholders who may not purchase electricity from us.

In fact, every fall in this magazine, we publish a list of names of members and former members we are looking for who are owed capital credits. This is why we stress that you give us your current address if you move out of our service area; you may still be owed capital credits in the future, and we need to be able to send them to you.

Receiving capital credits is one of many benefits of being a member-owner of your local electric cooperative. Returning cash to our members is another way that cooperatives prove their business focus is (and will always be) on *you* — the member.

Holmes-Wayne Electric Cooperative has retired over \$17.8 million

in cash to its member-owners in the past 14 years!

HWEC distributes \$15,000 in scholarships to 10 local high school seniors

olmes-Wayne Electric Cooperative announced the winners of its annual college scholarship competition, held late February at the cooperative's Millersburg office.

Laurel Sidle of Triway High School and Andrew **Cochran** of Wooster High School are the first-place winners of \$2,500 scholarships in the girls' and boys' divisions of the 2018 Holmes-Wayne Electric Cooperative Scholarship Contest. Sidle and Cochran were part of a group of 36 students representing nine area high schools who competed for a total of \$15,000 in scholarships.
